

History

1881 – Alfred Ernest Skinner founded A E Skinner & Co. in Orchard Street, W1

1890s – Alfred Skinner summonsed to the palace to show jewellery to Queen Victoria, subsequently receiving his first Royal Appointment to King Edward VII.

1922 – A E Skinner & Co. moved to 34-35 Old Bond Street

1934 – John Sheldon purchased jewellers Bentley & Co. situated on 65 New Bond Street.

1980 – Directorship of Skinner & Co. passed to Richard Skinner from his father, Lionel Skinner

1985 – Directorship of Bentley & Co. passed to Mark Evans from his great Uncle, John Sheldon.

1989 – Skinner & Co moved to 30 Old Bond Street.

1992 – Bentley & Co. moved to 8 New Bond Street and engaged Paul Greer as the new manager, a position that he holds today.

1998 – With no children to continue the family business, Richard Skinner decided to seek a merger with another firm of jewelers. This was most successfully effected with the well-established, family-owned firm of Bentley & Co, situated close by at 8 New Bond Street. Later that year, Mr Evans, managing director of Bentley & Skinner (Bond Street Jewellers Ltd) was honoured to be granted the Royal Warrant of Appointment as Jewellers & Silversmiths to H M Queen Elizabeth II and HRH The Prince of Wales.

2007 – The creation of Bentley & Skinner's most challenging commission – Damien Hirst's For the Love of God – was completed. The famous diamond skull acts as a dazzling celebration of the jeweller's art.

2009 – After 75 years in Bond Street, Bentley & Skinner moved to its fine new premises at 55 Piccadilly.

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
